What do you know of British Politics? Do you know any parties or their leaders? Who is the government, who is the opposition? Have you heard of UKIP and Nigel Farage?

Answer these questions.

- What is his first reaction to the caller's question?
- What stipulations does Australia set?

What other approaches could a country take? What do these involve?

Your teacher will give you a side in the class debate on migration policy:

*Integrational versus Multicultural*
